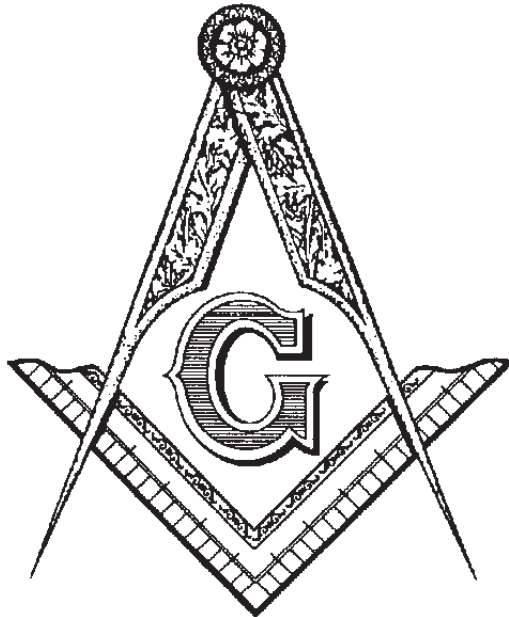

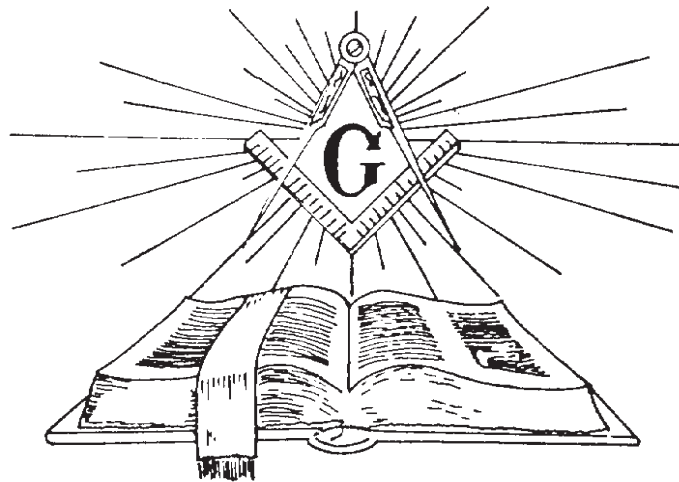
There are many facts on the masons but here is few I thought were interesting. At its peak in 1959, there were 4,103,161 Masons in the United States today, there are about 1,700,000 Worldwide, there are an

estimated 3,500,000 Masons in about 12,500 Lodges in virtually every free nation in the world. As of today, there are approximately 60,000 New York Masons and 600 lodges in New York State. At its peak in 1929, there were 346,413 Masons in New York State.

Nationwide, Masons contribute close to 2 million dollars daily to charitable causes across the United States. I think that the numbers above peak for themselves but at the same time we must be careful in who we recommend for a prospective candidate. I would like every brother in the district to think of a person who they think would make a good brother. Bring that prospective brother to a lodge open house or bring a friend tonight and show them the lodge and tell them who and what the masons are and what we do.

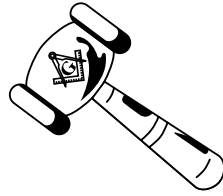

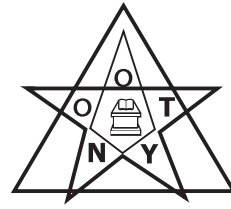

In the early 1930's DeMolay founder Frank S. Land had been thinking of an honor he could bestow on DeMolays and Senior

DeMolays for outstanding service to the Order. He wanted to honor them now, instead of waiting for them to be nominated for the Legion of Honor in years to come. He also wanted to honor Senior DeMolays who had been working with chapters even though they were not Masons, but had performed outstanding service to the Order.

The Degree of Chevalier is the highest honor for distinguished DeMolay service that can be awarded to a DeMolay by the International Supreme Council of the Order of DeMolay. Approximately one percent of all members of the Order receive the Degree of Chevalier. Today, the rolls of the Chevalier Degree number approximately 27,000.

Many famous masons who have gone before Installation at Celestial Lodge. As we are all well aware, and as is pointed out in the North East Angle Lecture in the Canadian Rite Ritual, it cannot be denied that we always had many members of rank and affluence. Over the centuries many well known men have been members of our Noble Craft. For a few moments, please allow your imaginations to run wild and consider what may take place at the Installation of The Celestial Lodge, otherwise known as the Grand Lodge Above. Even though it was late fall, there was a warm breeze blowing and the sun was setting behind the Lodge Hall. Gathered in the parking lot filled with their works were Bros Henry Ford, Ransom Olds, Walter Chrysler, John Willys and Andre Citroen. The only vehicle missing was Bro Hart Massey's tractor. Greeting members in the entrance hall was Bro Cliff Arquette of Charley Weaver fame and Bro Ed Wynn. In the boardroom, a group of senior DeMolays were gathered including Bros Walter Disney, Chet Huntley, Wendell Corey, Van Johnson, Robert Cummings, John Steinbeck, Fred McMurray and John Cameron Swayze. King Gillette, razor in hand, passed the lodge caretaker who was having a minor problem with his vacuum cleaner, which was quickly cleared up with the help of its inventor, Bro Frank Hoover, while at the other end of the hallway Bros Emmett Kelly, Clyde Beatty and all seven of the Ringling Bros were discussing the Shrine Circus. Taking a quick look into the Banquet Hall, Bros John Molson, Frederick Pabst and Joseph Schlitz were busy rolling in some kegs of beer for Bros Sam Bronfman, late President of Seagram's Distillers, who was setting up the bar for the Festive Board to follow the Ceremony. Bro Colonel Harland Sanders was cooking up a storm in the kitchen and it was an easy guess as to what the evening meal would consist of. The orchestra members for the dance to follow the Banquet were tuning. Members of this All-Star group included leader Bros Paul Whiteman, W. C. Hardy, Nat King Cole, Irving Berlin, George M. Cohan, Cyril Stapleton, Duke Ellington, Louis Armstrong, Count Basie and Al Jolson. Tonight's performance would be M.C.ed by Bros Arthur Godfrey and Danny Thomas. Magical Bros Harry Houdini and Harry Blackstone were setting up heir props while Bros W. C. Fields, Oliver Hardy, Bud Abbott, Harpo Marx, and Foster Brooks were fine tuning their comedy routines for tonight's show which was being produced by Bros Cecil B. DeMille, Flo Ziegfeld, Louis B. Mayer,

Hall Wallis and D. W. Griffiths.

A number of sports celebrities were gathering together, including Bros Abe Saperstein, creator of the Harlem Globetrotters, who was explaining his version of the game to Bro James Naismith, the inventor of the game. They were joined by baseballers, Bros Charles Ebbetts, Ty Cobb, Branch Rickey and Cy Young, the first pitcher to be inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame.

A little further along the hall was an array of masons dressed in knee breeches, lace cuffs and powdered wigs, others in tuxedos, including Bros Kit Carson, Davy Crockett and Buffalo Bill Cody, clad in their familiar buckskins, and Native American Chiefs, Bros Crazy Bull, Tecumseh and Joseph Brant in their native attire. Most colourful are the military uniforms of Lord Nelson, Lord Cornwallis, Captain James Cook, the Duke of Wellington and John Paul Jones.

I was gazing in awe at these members of Celestial Lodge, when the Grand Master, M.:W.: Bro Harry Truman, appeared from the preparation room accompanied by Bros John Jacob Astor, Luther Burbank, J. C. Penney, Adlai Stevenson and Jennings Bryan.

Bro John Diefenbaker had just signed the Tyler's Register with one of Bro John Schaeffer's pens. He was accompanied by Bros Robert Borden and R. B. Bennett, fellow Canadian Prime Ministers, and by Bro Joe Smallwood of Newfoundland.

At this time, the Tyler, Bro J. Edgar Hoover, informed the brethren that the meeting was about to come to order.

On entering the lodge room, the brethren were greeted by the Inner Guard, Bro Paul Revere. Seated already were polar explorers, Robert F. Scott of England and Bro Richard E. Byrd of the United States, together with Matthew G. Perky and Canada's Henry Larsen. Bro Charles Lindbergh could be seen in deep conversation with Bros Hap Arnold, Gus Grissom, Eddie Rickenbaker and Charles Kingsford-Smith.

From the Junior Warden's station came a burst of laughter. Bro Will Rogers had brought broad smiles to the faces of the Royal personages gathered around him, including Bros George I, Frederick the Great, Gustav V of Sweden and George VI. To the right of the Junior Warden's chair, architect Bro Sir Christopher Wren was joined by Statue of Liberty sculptor, Bro Frederic Bartholdi. Bros Norman Vincent Peale and Peter Marshall, who would assume the Chaplain's duties this evening, were in conversation with the Bros Du Pont, Peter and Victor, and the Bros Rothschild, James and Nathan. Gathered around the Secretary's desk, Bro Rudyard Kipling was discussing the evening's

proceedings with Bro Robert Burns, who was to give one of the Charges assisted by Bro Mark Twain. Also taking part were Bros Arthur Conan Doyle, Walter Scott, Samuel Johnson, Alexander Pope and Robert Service.

The Grand Organist, Bro Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, was discussing last minute changes with Bros Gilbert and Sullivan.

Bros Clark Gable, Peter Sellers, Wallace Beery, Douglas Fairbanks and Brian Donleavy were discussing boxing with champions, Bros Jack Dempsey, Jack Johnson and Sugar Ray Robinson. Another small group, in the persons of Bros John Wayne, Hoot Gibson and Tom Mix, were listening to Bro William Thaddeus Phillips (also known as Butch Cassidy.)

The founding members, Bros George Washington, Sir John A. MacDonald, Giuseppe Garibaldi, Benito Juarez, John Hancock and Ben Franklin were seated in the East. They have been joined by Bro Sir Stamford Raffles, founder of Singapore.

The Generals, Bros Omar Bradley, Jimmy Doolittle, George C. Marshall, John Pershing and Douglas McArthur, take their seats next to Bros Franklin D. Roosevelt and Winston Churchill. The Lodge Treasurer, Bro Henry Knox was busy collecting dues from Bros Thomas E Dewey and William McKinley. The Master,

M.: W.: Bro HRH The Duke of Connaught, has rapped the gavel to call the Lodge to order, and it is now time for us to depart. With one last look at this brilliant assembly, one wonders what the public's perception of Freemasonry might be if they were able to visit such a lodge.

Answers to the Salty Dog Quiz on Masonic Balloting

True 1) A ballot is a "secret vote" The ballot on a petition should always be secret and inviolable (hdbk. 545)

True 2) Ordinarily "ballot" meant a round pill used for a Secret vote Although it is of non-Masonic origin it is interesting to note that ballot is defined in Webster's Dictionary as white and black balls; one for affirmative, the other for negative.

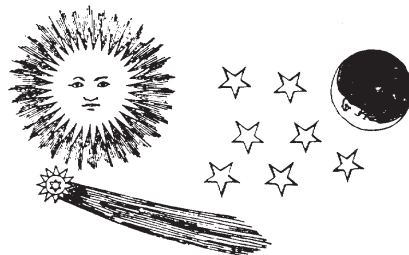
True 3) The Demand for a ballot is undeniable. The Book of Constitutions recognizes the demand for a ballot to be an undeniable right of any Brother of the Lodge Nor does the Brother making the demand (that is the request) have to give a reason. Since trust is one of the fundamental governing principles among Masons it is assumed that the Brother making the demand is doing so for good Masonic reasons and in the constitutions

protect the right to demand a ballot as being undeniable. When the ballot being demanded is on a candidate for initiation or a Brother seeking advancement to the next degree it must be made at a stated communication. Or it can be made at a Special Communications if the purpose of the meeting is to confer that particular degree the demand may also apply to a Brother whom the Lodge has accepted for affiliation provided that Brother has not yet signed the by-laws to consummate his membership . (hdbk. 563&1079)

True 4) when requested a ballot must be taken and cannot be Postponed beyond a reasonable time. Whether it is on a petition following the report of the Lodge's investigating committee or in response to a brother's demand for a re-ballot it is the responsibility of the lodge to ballot within a reasonable time. If the ballot is postponed the specific time when it will be taken must be determined at the time of the postponement. In other words, the expectation is that normally a ballot will be taken at the time of the Investigation Committee's report or on demand from a Brother of the Lodge. If a postponement is necessary, it is required that a new date be determined then and there. It is assumed that the ballot will be taken as soon as possible. It may never be postponed indefinitely or to a date in the future that may be considered " beyond a reasonable time " Nor may a postponement be announced where the decision on when it will be taken is likewise deferred to a subsequent Communication Finally, on ballot may be postponed when it is obviously being done to prevent a Brother or Brothers from being able to ballot or exercising their right to object. (hdbk. 539)

True 5) Once a petition has been turned over to an Investigation committee it must be balloted upon. Once a lodge has received a petition for initiation (except one requiring a waiver of jurisdiction) and has referred it to an Investigating Committee it must be acted upon by ballot. It is the Brother of the lodge, expressing themselves through the ballot, who ultimately decide the acceptance or rejection of a petition. In addition our Constitutions define other rights and action of both the lodge and petitioner regarding a petition but all are based on results of the ballot (for example the constitutionally defined waiting period before a rejected petitioner may be proposed again or petition another lodge) (hdbk. 536)

True 6) A demand for a re-ballot may be withdrawn at any time prior to the taking of the ballot.



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
